## SOME ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

The Work Commission hopes that this Resource Manual provides an adequate starting point for those interested in a Franciscan approach to the meaning and purpose of our work. There are a number of additional resources both within and outside of the Secular Franciscan Order for those looking to expand their horizons. Some of the best are listed below.

- 1. Work Commission Web Site. As a regional work commission person, you can save yourself a lot of time and effort in copying material by directing interested parties to the web site.
